A Hearty New Year Filled with God's Grace dear Lutherans!

As I reflect a bit on the past year I am so very, very grateful to God for His grace at keeping us in the faith by His Spirit and Gospel but also how He has (through you) helped provide for the body and soul needs of our Lutheran friends some 3,626 miles away in Haiti. As I write this note there are over \$9000 in freewill offerings given to help dig a new well at Eglise Evangelique Lutherienne du bon Berger de Leogane - (Good Shepherd Evangelical Lutheran Church of Leogane, Haiti, West Indies). These offerings were given by members of First Lutheran, members of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church, Kingston, NY and other Lutherans in California, Indiana and New Mexico. Our friend Pastor Thomas Bernard is overwhelmed by this kindness and gift. When someone gives another person a gift because of the love of Christ that lives within him, it's hard to express thanks in human words. But we try and so I'll let Pastor Bernard's words serve that purpose:

Sep. 22 "...Concerning the water well needed in the area of Leogane where we have our third congregation, it will serve the whole congregation, the community members and the school. Even though with the earthquake of January 12, 2010 our poor sanctuary where the children came also to receive has been destroyed, we still have the same plan. Thanks be to our God and to the support of a few brothers and sisters in Christ, the new sanctuary is very close to its completion. All the glory is to God. The next step will be the construction of a modest school building for the kids there. The water well was and is still needed not only for the school but primarily for the whole ministry. " Water is the life for all the living beings". Yet, we have spent a lot of money on purchasing water for the construction of the new sanctuary. With a water well not only we will be able to better serve our members but we will also have water for the future construction, our garden and so on. Our plan was not to have a water well for a school but for the whole ministry there. Our thanks go to you and to each member of the church that are working so hard to get a water well to God's people there. That is very much appreciated.

Oct 3...This is to thank you for the hard work you are doing to provide to the needs of the needy ones. It is with great joy and excitement to know that one day the people there will have a water well where they can find physical water as the spiritual water has been yet distributed and continues to be distributed to them. What a positive impact will that make to the whole community. As has been previewed, the well will be used by not only the members of the church, the children of the school but also by the members of the community. A big "THANK YOU" is sent to each member of the First Lutheran Church for his willingness to provide the fund for the digging out of the water well. And when everything comes to its completion a special thank you letter will be sent again... Again, thank you so very much and may our gracious and compassionate God continue to bless you, the members of the family and the saints of the church!

Nov 8...Thank you so much for working so hard to get the water well dug in Leogane. Lophane Laurent is a member of our church in Caradeux and he will help us to get the well dug. It is up to me to thank you and not you to thank me. You always work for us; I wonder when will we be able to work for you. Thank you in advance for your willingness,

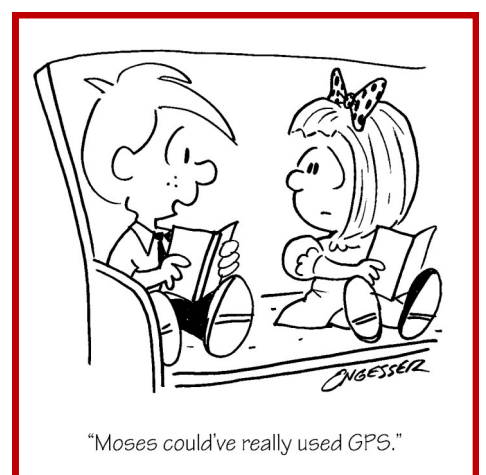
THE CONTINUING CONVERSATION

LCMS HELPING SANDY SURVIVORS WITH A 'LONG, LONG' RECOVERY

No congregations of The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod are located in the Rockaways, but that was no detour for LCMS members who volunteered in those Long Island, N.Y., communities on Monday (Nov. 12), grilling and delivering hot food to Superstorm Sandy survivors, including many elderly residents in high-rise apartment buildings still without power.

Two weeks after the epic storm hit the East Coast, Lutherans from 14 LCMS congregations continued to lend a hand to disaster-weary New Yorkers in an area that the Rev. Dr. David Benke says is among the hardest hit.

At the request of New York City officials, St. Peter's is serving as a disaster-relief staging center, helping distribute emergency supplies and coordinate volunteers. On Nov. 12, those volunteers included young people from Atlantic District congregations who helped serve some 1,200 grilled hamburgers and hot dogs. Alerted by city officials who said some Rockaways residents had been without a hot meal for nearly two weeks, the youngsters scaled multiple-stair flights in buildings with no functioning elevators to deliver food and LCMS Disaster Relief flood buckets of emergency supplies and toiletries.

"This is truly an example of mercy in action," said the Rev. Glenn F. Merritt, director of LCMS Disaster Response, who announced an additional \$25,000 grant to the Atlantic District for Sandy relief efforts. The funds will help cover the cost of hot meals, supply the St. Peter's staging area and fill 500 additional flood-relief buckets with necessities for survivors of the massive Oct. 29 storm.

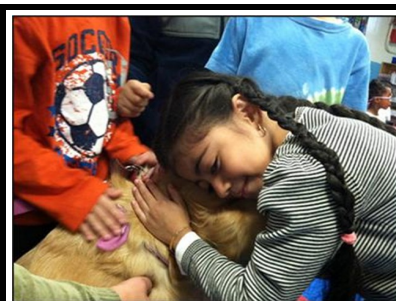
Also on Nov. 12, LCMS Disaster Response awarded a \$9,500 grant to Evangelical Immanuel Lutheran Church, Whitestone, N.Y., to assist with temporary housing for Sandy survivors.

Immediately after the storm, the church's pastor, the Rev. Dr. Johnson Rethinasamy, opened the church parsonage to five displaced families who lost their power. The congregation is now offering its Koinonia Mission House, typically used by ministry-related groups and mission teams on business in New York, to help families without power or shelter. Five families (totaling 34 people) with small children who lost electric power, and one family who lost everything are still staying in their Koinonia Mission House. Immanuel Lutheran Church is still in the process of taking in two more families.

According to Tracey Stillman, whose congregation, Village Lutheran Church in Lanoka Harbor, N.J., has been caught up in disaster-response efforts as a result of Superstorm Sandy, "it's not about us." That congregation has been providing hundreds of free meals; listening to — and reassuring — those who are hurting, especially children; serving as a sort of base of operations for Lutheran disaster-response staff; and nailing down a myriad of other details.

The real story, Stillman says, should focus on those who need help: the 350-plus children in the local public school where she teaches who were "seriously affected" by the storm, plus at least 10 teachers and staff "who lost pretty much everything" and hundreds of others in Lacy Township, N.J. — and untold numbers in numerous places all across the Eastern Seaboard — whose lives have been changed forever. At the school in the days following the storm, some of the students were cold, some didn't have heat or electricity at home, Stillman said. "We didn't give homework and we didn't give tests, that's for sure." In a class of special-needs ninth-graders, one boy asked another, "How's your house?" His response was to hang his head and start to cry. His home — and his grandmother's — had been totally washed away.

Since the Oct. 29 storm, the three-way ministry of Village and the local Methodist and Catholic churches to storm victims has "evolved," said Stillman. The three congregations continue to help each other, with the Methodists overseeing much of the emergency housing and meals, the Catholic church organizing a large clothing drive and some meals, and the Lutherans taking charge of tree and debris removal (while funneling food, clothing, blankets and toiletries to the other two churches).

BARBARA WEYMOUTH

We have so many wonderful people in our congregation here at First Lutheran! In this edition, we are blessed to share with you the "Barbara Weymouth Story" in her own words...

"My story begins on October 22, 1941, when I was born to loving parents, Otto and Lorna (Scherer) Lege. I was baptized two weeks later at St. Mark's Lutheran Church, Ohio; the very church my mother's family had attended for many years and where my mother and father were married!



I grew up in Cleveland, Ohio, and attended St. John's Lutheran Church. There were three services every Sunday; two in English and one in German. Just this past Reformation Sunday, Linda and I were able to attend church services at St. John's. The service was awesome and brought back lots of memories. The interior of the church is the same as it was in the 1950's. Pastor Marcis has continued to serve that congregation for 47 years and is still there!

I attended Kindergarten at a public school, but transitioned to St. John's Lutheran School in Cleveland where I stayed through the eighth grade. My class was the first to be confirmed in the new Sanctuary. Prior to that, Sunday worship services were held in a converted gymnasium on the second floor of the school building.

After graduating from high school, I worked as secretary to the director of research and testing at our local school district. I had no intention of going to college and chose to follow in my Mom's footsteps and be a secretary. Working for the school district whetted my appetite for college and teaching, so I started attending night school at Cleveland State University (Fenn College back then). It didn't take me long to transfer to Kent State University. I attended an extension campus at the local high school and then transferred to the main campus. I taught first grade in the Willoughby-Eastlake Schools, one of the Cleveland suburbs, for three years. During that time, I was enrolled in a special program enabling me to teach and attend the university at the same time in order to earn my Bachelor's Degree. This was a common practice because teachers were in great demand. I received my Degree in Elementary Education. After graduation, both my sister, Linda, and I accepted teaching positions in California. We both taught first grade in Rowland Unified School District but in different schools. About 5 years later, we both moved back to Ohio for awhile. I accepted a position in southern Ohio as a kindergarten teacher/head teacher. I was a full-time kindergarten teacher and completed all duties and responsibilities of a site principal. This was the catalyst that propelled me back to Kent State to earn my Master's Degree in Educational Administration. Linda and I really missed California, so we moved back to the Whittier area and were rehired by Rowland Heights. Linda was assigned teaching the first grade, but I was assigned to Rincon Intermediate where I taught 7th and 8th grade math for two years. I really enjoyed working with the older students. In many ways they're no different from 1st graders!

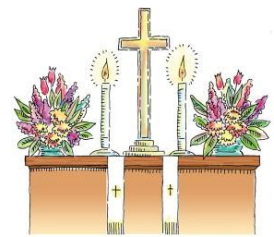

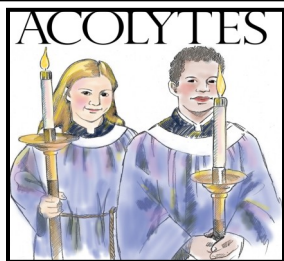

TEN QUESTIONS WITH SEMINARIAN ERIC EDONG

Eric Ekong is currently a fourth-year student at Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, where he is preparing for the ministry and following in the footsteps of his father and grandfather. But Ekong's family tree is different from most. His grandfather, Jonathan Udo Ekong, founded The Lutheran Church of Nigeria in the 1930s and spent the latter half of his 101 years planting churches and schools throughout the country. Today, this LCMS partner church has more than 80,000 baptized members. Although he never met his famous grandfather, Eric Ekong knew that he also was called to the pastoral ministry. Ekong hails from Cleveland, Ohio, and he earned his undergraduate degree from Concordia University, Ann Arbor, Mich. He and his wife, Linda, have five children.

1. Can you tell me about your famous roots?

My grandfather came over in 1928 to find the "one true religion." He bounced around, but once he found the LCMS his search was over. He entered the seminary at Immanuel Lutheran College and Seminary in North Carolina. He was 47 at that time and had to redo his whole education. In 1936, he traveled back to Nigeria with LCMS missionaries and planted numerous churches and schools. He would later become the first president of The Lutheran Church of Nigeria.

2. When did you know you wanted to be a Lutheran pastor?

I knew in high school.

3. What brought you to the seminary?

I don't have a fantastic story. I knew for some time that I would go. There were circumstances where God was preparing me for my true calling — from being diagnosed with Lupus SLE to coaching basketball to becoming an elder and president of a congregation. He put all the maturation experiences in place, so here I am.

4. What did you do before the seminary?

I was a Unix administrator. I worked in information technology for Verizon for 10 years.

5. What type of ministry do you hope the Lord has in store for you?

Parish ministry and anything that involves evangelizing and discipling while crossing ethnic/cultural boundaries. My business degree in leadership also allows me to use those skills in different parts of the church.

6. What advice would you give to fathers coming to the seminary?

Pray, read your Bible and always keep your family first. Make sure they know what the ministry is all about. Your life and devotion to God should not only be transparent to your family, but to others who see you.

7. What are you reading these days?

I'm reading Pastoral Theology by Mueller, Church and Ministry by Walther and Symbolism in the Fourth Gospel. For the most part, I read seminary books because it's all I have time for at this point.

8. What is your favorite Bible verse?

It's a tossup between Is. 6:8, the "send me" verse, and Prov. 24:16. A man falls down seven times and gets back up. It's only by the grace of God that he can get back up and continue on. It's a reminder that God is always with us, empowering us, picking us up and guiding us down the right path.

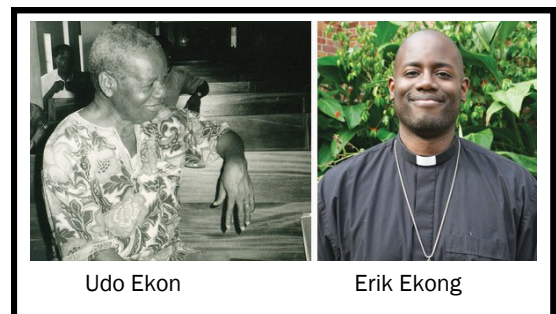
9. What does your name mean?
