From The Pastor's Desk:

Dear Family and Friends of First Lutheran,

Over the past years we have heard good and bad things about Islam. The following true story reminds the Christian Church both to pray and be a witness to anyone and everyone. The letter came to us from POBLO, Pastor Gary Rohwer, who we help sponsor to get the Word out to Muslims.

How An Invitation to Islam Opened the Door to Share the Gospel Recently, my wife, Mariam, and I had the opportunity to visit a Saudi Arabian family in our community. I had met Samy (the son) before, but his was the first time we interacted with his mother and two of his sisters. Samy's oldest sister did not join us, likely because I (being a male) was there, and she felt a bit uncomfortable. His mother was also shy and wore a hijab to cover her face.

During our visit, we spent about two hours discussing Saudi Arabian culture and highlighting the differences between Saudi Arabia and the United States, Samy's family home, but they expressed that they wish to remain here. They have come to appreciate the freedoms they are given, the openness of Americans, and the way that women are treated (very differently than in Saudi Arabia). They will be in the U.S. for another three months before returning to their country.

In the three months that Samy's family has been in the U.S., we were the first and only people to visit them and be invited into their home. They explained that they don't even trust their own people here, so they don't invite them to come to their home. We felt honored that they trusted us enough to have us over. The mother has asked Mariam to visit her again, so she is planning to go without me sometime in the coming weeks.

The day after visiting his family, I met with Samy. Our conversation started out like any typical conversation does; we covered topics like the weather and weekend plans. He even asked if my family would join his for a trip to the South to spend a week in a warmer place. We are thinking about it, since it's been very cold here in Minnesota!

The conversation eventually evolved to religion, and Samy invited me to consider joining Islam. In a kind and gentle way, he asked me if I had ever thought about Islam and told me that the light of Islam would clear my path and direct my steps. He apologized and said he was afraid that he had offended me with his boldness, but he insisted that he loves me and hopes that when I die, I will go to the same place that he will go. At this point, I couldn't be silent any longer. I asked him where he will go when he dies. He admitted that he doesn't know where he will go, so I asked him how he can invite me to join him in a place that he doesn't even know he is going to. He seemed a bit embarrassed.

I explained to him why I did not choose to follow Islam, which led me to explain the significant differences between Islam and Christianity. I shared the Gospel message of salvation with him and explained that as a Christian, I do not need to fear whether or not I will go to Heaven. The Bible says, "For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have Eternal Life." As Christians, we have the assurance of salvation! I met with him again the following week, planting more seeds and answering questions that he had.

I meet with Samy now on a weekly basis and talk with him on the phone almost every day. Samy has also been meeting with a local pastor once a week for almost two months now, and they will continue to meet until Samy and his family return home.

in the name of all the teachers, in the name of the pastors, in the name of all the members of the different congregations that we are serving and in my own name, I thank you ever so much for all the past, present and future blessings. The fact that you are sharing with us your resources means that you are helping us in the building of character, taking out the good news of salvation to the unsaved ones and bringing Christ to the dying ones. With your prayers, your help, your donations and your supports we are able to feed many souls spiritually and physically. The children are receiving not only good Christian education but also academic education which will make them better citizen. This Christian action from your side is the result of God's love and faith in your lives.

At Good Shepherd Evangelical Lutheran Church and School we are blessed. God is adding new souls to the flock in a regular basis. At Good Shepherd located in Port-au-Prince we are serving 500 to 560 members; at Good Shepherd in Village of Peace we are serving 300 members; at Good Shepherd in Leogane we are serving 90 to 120 members and in our new congregation located at Village Coracess (started one year ago) we are serving 85 members. In our school located in the Port-au-Prince, the capital city of Haiti, we have an attendance of 260 students. What a privilege and blessing to be led by Christ! Without your Christian love and your commitment we would not be able to accomplish all these. But all the glory is to our God. Our new project is to build a sanctuary for the saints at Village Coracess and start a school there for the children of the community. We have a unique method/philosophy: wherever we have a church we do have a school also because school is a means of evangelism for our ministry. Again, thank you so much and may our Lord and Savior continue to bless you and your ministry!

Ministry to the Armed Forces

Since the Civil War, Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod pastors have served as military chaplains. Today, the LCMS' Ministry to the Armed Forces supports 173 chaplains. Among these chaplains, 70 are active duty LCMS chaplains and 80 are serving Reserve and National Guard units.

Currently, one of these Reserve/Guard chaplains is mobilized in Bahrain. LCMS Ministry to the Armed Forces also supports 23 Civil Air Patrol chaplains.

Our active duty members usually work on a base or post, with a large support staff to care for their needs, such as financial counseling, baby sitting, health care, etc. However, our reserve community and their families are often located large distances from those support structures. Our hope is that our LCMS congregations can reach out to these families, especially when their loved ones are deployed, and help care for many of their needs.

LCMS Ministry to the Armed Forces initiated Operation Barnabas in 2007 as a response to the ever-increasing needs of returning servicemen and women. The program's goal is to equip and encourage LCMS congregations and their members, as well as local Operation Barnabas district counselors, for compassionate care and Gospel-sharing outreach to our military members, families and veterans.

More Mission Grants Funded

Supporters of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League (LWML) praise God for His faithfulness. By His grace, the following Mission Grants for the 2013-2015 biennium have been funded. Learn more about each grant on our website.

Third installment given to Lutheran Children's Books for Southeast Asia totaling \$40,000. This grant will allow the Lutheran Heritage Foundation to print and distribute approximately 9,000 copies of Luther's Small Catechism and 6,000 copies of A Child's Garden of Bible Stories into the languages of Southeast Asia. An additional \$13,000 is still needed to complete this grant.

Third gift of \$25,000 for Rebuilding Nord Est Haiti Lutheran School. This grant will help to rebuild the Lutheran primary school in Haiti, meet current earthquake standards, and serve the physical and spiritual needs of Haitian children. An additional \$25,000 is still needed to complete this grant.

This grant for <u>Christian Educational Support for</u> <u>Children - India</u> will help to reach 20,000 elementary-aged children in India with the Gospel message through Christian educational resources, provided by Concordia Gospel Outreach. With a gift of \$85,000, this grant is PAID IN FULL!

You may help fund the remaining mission grants of this biennium and meet our national mission goal of \$1.83 million. By God's grace, your mite offerings*, along with the contributions of other LWML supporters, help meet this mission goal. In addition, each district has their own mission grant goal.
